have updated facilities as plans to renovate the squad room and dispatch area are being worked out. Chief Miller and I also share the value of the Police Department working with, and being part of, our community. The Council and I look forward to working with Chief Miller.

As you know, the safety of our residents and businesses has always been a top priority for my administration. We will continue to fully support our Police Department as they become the best equipped and trained department in the State of New Jersey.

Sign Up NOW for Fresh Organic Produce from CSG at Genesis Farms

The Secaucus Environmental Department is set to continue the Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) Program for its fifth consecutive year with CSG at Genesis Farm.

Fresh, clean, healthy local food is the primary reason most people are drawn to Community Supported Agriculture. While this is a fine motivation, there are other important reasons why a CSA program is a good choice. The CSA community is not simply pre-buying vegetables, it is helping to support an actual running farm. The direct link between members and farmers puts the 'culture' back in 'agriculture' and as a result, our community begins to reconnect to the earth and each other.

Residents who sign up for a "share" will receive a bag of farm fresh, organic vegetables from New Jersey's CSG at Genesis Farm every other week for 24 weeks. The sizable biweekly share is \$510 for the entire season, beginning June 17th thru November 18th. Members pick up their share every other Wednesday at the Recreation Center on Koelle Blvd from 3:00 – 9:00 PM.
