

Get your COVID-19 Vaccine in Town

The Secaucus Vaccination POD is administering the COVID-19 vaccine and is open to those who live and work in Secaucus. Located at the Recreation Center at 1200 Koelle Boulevard, the site has successfully vaccinated thousands of eligible individuals. The vaccinations are free and Health insurance is not required. NJ Veteran Property Tax Deduction

In late 2020, the war time service requirement for the \$250 New Jersey Veteran Property Tax Deduction has been eliminated. You may qualify if:

- You are an honorably discharged veteran with active military service
- You are a surviving spouse/civil union/domestic partner of an honorably discharged veteran with active military service

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Secaucus High School Robotics Teams Snags Second Place in Nationwide Competition

A relatively new club at the Secaucus High School is making waves in the national circuit. The Patriots Robotics Club recently participated for the first time in a nationwide competition held by the Kiss Institute of Practical Robotics (KIPR) and was placed first in the Seeding Rounds and 2nd in the Double Elimination Rounds, giving it an overall rank of second in the nation.

The Secaucus Robotics Club currently has 18 members. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, only seven members were allowed to work in-person on the robot in Club Advisor Marissa Capobianco's classroom. More often than not, the team met and worked virtually to create a robot capable of completing a given set of tasks on an 8x8ft board. The journey had quite a lot of anxious moments. The day before the competition, the operating system on one of the computers on the robot crashed. Frantic hours led to a final fix and re-testing of the robot. On the day of the competition, the team was both excited and apprehensive. The day unfolded with quite a bit of drama—unexpected snags, two disastrous rounds, more revisions and re-coding on breaks between rounds. A last-minute solution came just in time for the final Seeding Round. The team scored the highest points, giving it the first place leading to the Elimination Rounds. The team proceeded undefeated until the Final Round where they could not overtake the team from Los Altos, California. The Secaucus High School Team won second place and won the Judge's Choice Award for the best overall robot and skills.

On April 2, 2021, the Secaucus Fire Department and Secaucus Police Department responded to a fire at 100 Castle Road. The site houses Command Web, a large publishing and printing firm that has a Secaucus presence for many years. Several Secaucus units, as well as fire departments of East Rutherford, Lyndhurst and Jersey City responded to extinguish the fire that was located in one of the chutes. The location of the fire made it a labor intensive response but the fire was brought under control efficiently. Command Web thanked the Secaucus Fire Department and Police Department at the April 6th Town Council Meeting and presented generous donations to each department.

Environmental Department Organizes Earth Day Clean-up

The Secaucus Environmental Department organized several events in April to mark Arbor Day and Earth Day 2021. Two cleanup days brought together more than 70 participants. The first session was held on April 22th at Mill Creek Point and another on April 24th at Mill Creek Marsh Trail. Volunteers hauled away several bags of Styrofoam, plastic bags, beverage bottles, tires, car parts, and even a large plastic trunk.

"We had an amazing turnout at both clean-up sessions. It was a great group of enthusiastic volunteers to work with! I hope people are more aware of what and where they are discarding litter, because what is left on land will end up polluting our waterways through stormwater runoff. Hopefully one day we will not have to organize clean-ups, but until then, if a group is interested in volunteering to keep Secaucus beautiful and clean, please call us and we'll be more than happy to coordinate it," said Environmental Coordinator Jennifer Schneider.

As part of the Reduce-Reuse-Recycle program, the Department also arranged GreenDrop, an organization that raises funds through the collection of donated clothing and household items, to pick up items left over from the Town-wide garage sale. About half a truck load of items were donated by residents. Proceeds from the donation will benefit The Purple Heart Foundation. The Environmental Department in conjunction with Harmon Cove Recreation Association also celebrated Arbor Day. Young participants plant trees, sunflowers and milkweed, and learned about the importance of trees and pollinator plants to the environment. to Friday, May 7th with limited number of attendees. Public Works staff will be planting a few new trees with some students outside both Elementary Schools ahead of the May 7th celebration. Trains are Running at the Museum

After a collaboration from several sources, the Town Museum has built a unique exhibit of Lionel Trains made in 1950. They are up and running, sound effects and all! A see-through platform has been erected, hanging from the ceiling, allowing visitors to view the trains from below and also an elevated view from a staircase built for children only.

There are two separate tracks operating: one with a small Lionel train set and one with the larger train. In addition to the cabooses, tenders and cattle cars, an entire village has been set up with everything from barns, animals, churches, drugstores, trees, signs, lights and an operating floodlight tower.

This exciting endeavor was conceived, planned, built, and executed by museum directors Tommy Schwarz and Scott Schaffer.
