Mayor's Corner

Another year comes to a close and it is time to look back with thanks and gratitude. I thank each one of you for the tremendous support my council members and I have received throughout the year. Without your encouragement, we would not have accomplished the things that make Secaucus a beautiful place to live and work. Our newly reelected Council Members also thank you for the confidence you have showed in our team. Each one of us truly appreciates this opportunity to serve you.

In 2022, we have launched three major initiatives to our parks systems. Trolley Park at the cul-de-sac of Paterson Plank Road has been completely refurbished. Two new park projects have been launched and are almost complete—the park on Farm Road expands our riverfront parks systems with the construction of the passive park, complete with a gazebo, two dog parks and walking areas. The community and sensory garden on Meadowlands Parkway is another great addition to the open recreational spaces in our community. Both are massive achievements given the extensive planning and execution that went into these efforts.

This year, our infrastructure improvements have resulted in the repaying of several streets including Centre Avenue, Julianne Terrace, Paulane Terrace, Acorn Road and Oak Lane. In addition, we launched a new project to include rain gardens off Centre Avenue—a groundbreaking initiative that not only harvests rainwater, but also helps with flooding due to rainwater runoff in the area.

Finally, the design of our brandnew Senior and Community Center project is well underway and making good progress. We are hopeful construction will begin in the Spring of 2023. I cannot wait for senior activities to be

hosted there as soon as it is complete. All of these projects would not be possible without the hard work of the men and women working to serve you through various departments in Town.

While you enjoy the beautiful decorations in the center of Town or drive by and enjoy decorated homes along the way, I hope it reminds you of the wonderful community we live in. Secaucus is a wonderful place to raise a family because of the beauty and kindness of the people who live here. Please continue to nurture this beautiful town and make amazing holiday memories with family and friends.

Resident Honored for Putting Out Fire





Cross of Gratitude Graces Immaculate Conception Church

For a week in early November, the Immaculate Conception Church in Secaucus was home to The Thanking Cross, also known as the Cross of Gratitude, that was carved in Lviv, Ukraine. The Cross is travelling across the globe and has been blessed by three popes—Pope John Paul II in 2004, Pope Benedict XVI in 2006 and in 2016 by Pope Francis. The mission is dedicated to the 2000th jubilee of the Crucifixion to be celebrated in 2033 and to the goal of visiting various capitals of the world with the hope of uniting all nations of the world into one family. Since the beginning of the Cross of Gratitude's pilgrimage, it has been carried by men and women of many faiths," said Vitaliy Sobolivsky, who started the mission in 2003.



The Cross is carved from Ukrainian oak and weighs approximately 800 pounds. Its pilgrimage has taken it to 46 capitals throughout Eastern and Western Europe including the Vatican. While in the United States, the Cross has visited Washington D.C., New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and churches in New Jersey, including Secaucus, and the goal is to cover an additional 160 capitals around the world.

Secaucus Volunteer Group Focuses on Homelessness

On Saturday, November 12, members of Hygiene Project, a youth community group focusing on helping those in need, held a Walkathon and Box City Campout to highlight the issue of homelessness. Students gathered at the Secaucus Library parking lot and walked to Buchmuller Park. Later in the evening, they set up "box homes", small shelters made from cardboard



boxes, and camped at Buchmuller Park until midnight to get a feel of the conditions faced by the homeless. "Homelessness is an issue that is getting more acute, and the Box City Campout is our attempt to understand the



issue with more empathy. I thank Mayor Gonnelli, the Town Council and the Police Department for their support and for helping to make this a successful event," said Hygiene Project's Cathy Wolf.

Secaucus Honors Our Veterans

Our own Veteran's Day Ceremony at Town Hall, honors Secaucus veterans who proudly serve(d) our nation, and in turn make Secaucus proud. Residents and veterans joined Mayor Gonnelli and Town Council members to celebrate the continuing contributions of our veterans and the many ways they enrich our community.

This year's ceremony also marked the recognition of a very special veteran who continuously works to help the cause of veterans not just in Secaucus, but throughout the area. Councilman William McKeever, a Vietnam War veteran and active VFW member, has been a champion of veteran causes and has assisted veterans with housing, job placement, home renovation and more importantly, ensuring that qualified veterans get the vital benefits they deserve. He does all this with humility and discreetly, always deflecting attention from himself and instead focusing on the strength of the veterans. McKeever served in the US Army from 1966 to 1968 with tours of duty with the 3rd Armored Division, Frankfurt, Germany, and as Sergeant in Vietnam. He selflessly gives back to the veteran community through various affiliations and leadership positions including Life Member of the VFW, member of American Legion, Sr. Vice Commander of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, Finance Officer of Flotilla 10-2, Treasurer of Flotilla 32 Inc., Life Member of Vietnam Vets of America, and as Liaison for Veterans to Congressman Pascrell.

Earlier in the day, Hudson County honored Patrick 'Littlewolf' Brooks, an Army veteran with tours in Iraq and Afghanistan, with the 2022 Hudson County Veteran of the Year Award. He is a member of the Tuscarora nation of the Iroquois Confederacy in upstate New York. His passion for educating the public about Native culture has taken him to numerous venues to conduct presentations and dance programs to audiences of all ages sharing the history and culture of Indigenous Americans and First Nations People. He is an accomplished dancer and has served as a member of the head staff at several Native gatherings.
